## DOUBLE ACROSTIC X MINUS THREE

(In Looking Glass Land, things go in reverse. The next acrostic will be $\boldsymbol{X}$ minus Four.)
You will need to print the acrostic in order to solve it. When the diagram is filled in, it will contain a quotation from a published work. Numbered squares in the diagram correspond to the numbered blanks to be filled in with the answers to the clues. The first letters of each answer, when read downwards, will spell the name of the author and the title of the work from which the quotation comes. The letter following the number in each square indicates the clue whose answer includes the letter to be entered in that square. Nearly all the clues have something to do with children's literature. You do not need to know more than about 8 (some say 6) answers to begin. As skeletons of words begin to form in the diagram and some initial letters of author and title are in place, work back and forth. Soon the parts of the puzzle will solve one another. Answers will be posted on the site on July 2, 1998.

The White Knight is affronted! He was just getting the idea of these puzzles, he says, when the rules changed! Not a big change, but still ... how can the puzzler do that just because the quotation she likes so much doesn't have enough Ks in it? So there they are, two Ks already written in Clues K and Z that don't get entered into the quotation.
