Remembrance of Things Past


When Canadian illustrator **Harvey Chan** was presented last fall with the Elizabeth Mrazik-Cleaver Canadian Picture Book Award for illustration for *Ghost Train* (written by **Paul Yee**), he wasn't just overcome by the emotion of winning IBBY-Canada's prestigious prize, but by some ghosts from his own past. IBBY-Canada had arranged for Chan to receive the award at one of the monthly meetings of CANSCAIP (The Canadian Society of Children's Authors, Illustrators and Performers) which are held at a Toronto private school, De La Salle College. IBBY-Canada wanted to present the award to Chan in the presence of his peers. Little did the organizers know that Harvey had actually attended De La Salle for two years of high school when he emigrated to Canada from Hong Kong. The MaD hAtTeR noted that Chan was just a little nervous about returning to De La Salle -- even as an award-winning children's book illustrator! What the MaD hAtTeR wants to know is -- was young Harvey an award-winning student too?
